# WHAT IS TOR?



The Internet has made it easier than ever to share information with people all over the world. But it also makes it easier for governments to track and monitor their citizens.

**OCTOPUS NOT SO GREAT!**  
Many governments also block their citizens from seeing certain websites. The Great Firewall of China censors websites including the New York Times, Amnesty International and YouTube.

By monitoring internet use, governments can link you to your private information.

# TOR!

Tor is divided into two parts: software that allows you to use the Internet anonymously, and an open network of computers that makes it possible for that software to work.

When you use Tor, your IP address remains hidden. It appears that your connection is coming from the IP address of a Tor exit relay, which can be anywhere in the world.

The Tor Software depends on the Tor network, which is made up of Tor relays run by individuals all over the world. The more Tor relays we have running, the faster the network runs and the more secure and robust it becomes.
